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B. Executive Summary, Project Purpose and Benefits

Essay Question

Executive Summary of the proposed project:

The City of Brownsville has an estimated population of 189,970 with 36% of its residents living at or below the Federal Poverty Level with a median income of \$24,468 (US Census 2006-2008 American Community Survey). Brownsville is home to a vulnerable Hispanic population (91.3 percent of the population is Hispanic US Census 2008) where barriers of language and literacy compromise educating residents about the use of broadband services. The poverty level, coupled with social and/or cultural barriers that also serve to isolate residents, results in substantial areas of the city where broadband services are underutilized. Low service usage may be attributed to economic factors, as well as to insufficient technical or literacy skills, or to lack of understanding of the services offered. As a result, a substantial percentage of residents do not have access to information and resources required to obtain and maintain meaningful employment, participate fully in activities designed to further their educational goals, obtain information to improve or maintain their health.

The City of Brownsville Public Library System (System) is a Texas State Library and Archives Accredited Public Library. The System has a State approved Technology Plan and has used technology to provide services to the residents of Brownsville since it first opened its doors in 1994. It has been successful in attaining and managing over \$7,389,000.00 in Grants since it opened in 1994. The System has been awarded over \$5,550,000.00 in Federal Grants from the Universal Services Administrative Company Schools and Library Federal E-rate program.



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Project: Connect Brownsville Will increase Public Computer Access and Broadband awareness in 6 Ways:

Broadband Connection:

The City of Brownsville Public Library System has a 190' tower already in place at the Central Blvd. location that will provide a mounting point for the hardware necessary to connect all members of the Connect Brownsville project through the use of Sky Pilot Wireless Networking Hardware to be installed on the tower and at the remote locations. The System will then provide a 70MBPS dedicated fiber connection to the Internet for Broadband access.

Expand Central Branch Library Public Computer Center:

Currently, public computing resources offered by the two public library locations are insufficient to meet the demand of Brownsville and the surrounding areas that the Library System serves. The Southmost Branch Library has a lab equipped with 42 internet computers and serves 187,393 residents annually (2008 Annual Report for the Public Information Services Department. The Central Branch Library serves nearly twice as many residents and has only 24 computers with internet access. The average internet sessions per week is 3463 with 72% of users having to wait up to one hour to initiate an internet session. An expansion of the Public Computing Center would increase the number of internet sessions by 120%, projecting to 4156 internet sessions per week.

An increase in computers would increase the number of users. Often residents are put on a waiting list that can last up to an hour; and, when given access their time is limited to just one hour of usage. Expanding the Central Branch Library with the purchase of an additional 183 computers would allow more residents internet access at one time. This project will be managed by the Public Information Services Department and the Library Automation Department that has over 43 years of combined experience in maintaining the security, reliability and usability of computer networks.

Texas Southmost College Mobile Computer Lab:



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Texas Southmost College(TSC) is a community college that serves 17,000 students and has over 1,500 staff members. In collaboration with the System, TSC is proposing a mobile lab computing center that will be available to the public. The mobile lab will consist of 30 laptop computers that will operate mainly through the college's wireless network. In addition, the 30 laptop computers will be available for check-out to campus users as well as other community users with valid identification. The mobile lab will also be used in other locations throughout the region in which the college operates. This is especially true for the International Technology Center for Economics and Commerce, or ITEC Center, which is operated by the University of Texas at Brownsville to improve the economy of the region with economic development and job training activities.

United Way Public Computer Center:

United Way of Southern Cameron County works to build stronger communities by empowering people to help one another to mobilize the caring power of our communities. In collaboration with the System, United Way will receive 5 new computers, equipment, and upgraded broadband access to better serve the community by providing easily accessible resources to jobs opportunities, expansive health information, and increasingly accessible government websites,among others.

Brownsville Literacy Center Mobile Computer Lab

The Brownsville Adult Literacy Center (Center) is a non-profit organization committed to expanding adult literacy and furthering the goal of bringing adult education to the public. In the past, the Center has received grant funding that established the Mobile Learning Lab – an outstanding service that has helped many in desperate need of reading and writing skills. In order to improve these efforts, the Center has partnered with the System to replace 12 new computers, and upgrade broadband access. This project will allow community members to benefit from services such as basic math and reading, GED preparation, keyboarding, and English-as-a-second-language (ESL) classes.

The Brownsville Public Library System has partnered with Workforce Solutions – Cameron to create economic growth and enhance the quality of life for the citizens and employers of Cameron County. With the additional Broadband stations, increasing numbers of community patrons will have access to career and training information.



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The project will create 65 indirect jobs, 50 induced jobs, and save over 100 jobs for staff from the system, Texas Southmost College, United Way of Southern Cameron County, Brownsville Adult Literacy Center, and Workforce Solutions-Cameron. The project will service more than 187,000 residents and visitors of Brownsville and provide them with the necessary resources to obtain job training, literacy skills, improved job skills and college preparation. The overall cost of implementing this project is \$1,257,818.00.

Project purpose:

The City of Brownsville Public Library System (System,) along with the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center, United Way of Southern Cameron County and Texas Southmost College propose the expansion of Broadband and public computer center access to the community of Brownsville, Texas in order to raise the quality of life through exposure to increased career, education, government, social, health and related service awareness. The System has successfully garnered over \$7,000,000 in federal grants and with the assistance of additional funds through Connect Brownsville, it will be allowed to utilize the full potential of the network infrastructure that has been built over the past several years. Working with strong community partners further expands service to Brownsville, Texas-a community in desperate need of reliable and free access to Broadband service.

Recovery Act and Other Governmental Collaboration:

- There are no Recovery Act, or other federal or state developmental program, funds being leveraged with this project.

Technology Strategy:

The City of Brownsville Public Library System (System) will use CAT 6 cable drops to provide Broadband access to its Central Blvd. location. The Brownsville Adult Literacy Center, the United Way of Southern Cameron County and Texas Southmost College will be connected to the Central Blvd. library via a Sky Pilot mesh network Topology. The Central Blvd. library has in place a multi gigabit network to support Internet Traffic, an APC silicon battery backup system along with a backup generator. The System has been providing Internet services since the inception of its first public computer center in 1994 and continues to look for ways to expand Broadband services to the public. This project will allow the System to provide the service it currently offers and expand broadband service to the residents of the ever-growing community of Brownsville. Strong collaborative efforts with the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center, the United



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Way of Southern Cameron County and Texas Southmost College can be replicated in any community in need of increased Broadband and public computer center access. Results of said project include an increased quality of life through higher numbers of community members accessing valuable career, education and social services, among others.

The public computer centers at the City of Brownsville Public Library System, Texas Southmost College United Way of Southern Cameron County, and the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center will be available to all members of the community; there is no cost involved.

Description of the involvement of the partners listed above in the project.

The City of Brownsville Public Library System (System) is collaborating with the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center to provide High Speed Wireless Internet Access and replace the 12 obsolete computers in the Mobile Learning Lab. This lab travels around the community conducting job training, assisting residents in filling out job applications, and conducting literacy programs for the underserved residents of Brownsville.

The System is collaborating with the United Way of Southern Cameron County to provide High Speed Wireless Internet Access and 5 computers that would be used for job training, financial counseling, job searches and filling out job applications.

Texas Southmost College will expand their University Blvd. public computer center through a mobile computer lab utilizing Broadband access. Expansion will include the purchase of a mobile lab equipped with 30 laptop computers that will be available for access to campus outreach programs and community patrons. The Library, and TSC staff will provide college preparation activities, including financial aid research and career training.

The following partners, City of Brownsville Public Library System, Texas Southmost College, the Adult Literacy Center, and the United Way of Southern Cameron County, all follow specific affirmative steps prohibiting discrimination based on race, sex, ethnic origin, religion, disability and age.

Accessibility

The Library System and Texas Southmost College are in full compliance with The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and considers it a crucial part of their role in the community to be welcoming to all.

Expansion of the computer lab will have a universal design; in essence, it will be designed for a broad range of users including residents with a wide range of hearing, visual, mobility and learning impairments. All equipment will be accessible to wheelchair users, documents will be available in accessible electronic formats for those with visual impairments, and the lab will be



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equipped with at least one adjustable workstation/table. Further, large-print keytop labels, screen enlargement software and monitors at least 17 inches in size will be utilized.

The Texas Southmost College computer labs on campus are made accessible in various ways. Labs and many of their workstations are readily accessible by wheelchair users. In addition, when assistive technology is needed, the lab partners with UTB/TSC Disability Services to facilitate use of equipment. The library staff assists patrons with disabilities as needed, and the library aspires to accessibility in all of its services.

Other Languages

According to the US Census in 2008, 92 percent of the population in Brownsville is Hispanic or Latino and 88 percent of those residents speak Spanish. There is often a large language barrier within Brownsville and surrounding areas in Cameron County. Therefore, the City of Brownsville Public Library System, United Way of Southern Cameron County, and Texas Southmost College will offer training and outreach in both English and Spanish to better serve our community.

In addition, the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center will teach English-as-a-second-language (ESL) classes to serve students who are literate in their native language (Spanish for most students,) and who wish to become literate in English.

Outreach

Public Computing Centers Outreach

The following partners, City of Brownsville Public Library System, Texas Southmost College, the Adult Literacy Center, and the United Way of Southern Cameron County, will continue current outreach efforts in respect to providing access to expanded Broadband and computer center access throughout the community. Media outlets, such as Channel 12, the City of Brownsville website, the campus website and related media outlets, and additional partner websites will be fully utilized to ensure community members in Brownsville are aware of expanded services.



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The City of Brownsville Public Library System is open to all community members and visitors during the following hours: Monday – Thursday between 10 am to 9 pm, Friday and Saturday between 10 am to 6 pm, and on Sunday between 1 pm to 8 pm.

Texas Southmost College is open to students, staff, faculty and community patrons during the following hours: Monday – Thursday between 7:30 am to 11 pm, Friday 7:30 am to 5 pm, Saturday between 9 am to 5 pm and on Sunday between 1 pm to 10 pm.

The Adult Literacy Center Mobile Lab is available Monday through Thursday during regular business hours. Lastly, United Way of Southern Cameron County operate Monday to Friday during regular business hours.

Training and Education

Peripherals and equipment

The City of Brownsville Library System is requesting 183 Dell Optiplex 760 Desktops with GB Ethernet cards with monitors that will be able to print to Dell 5210 color printers. 183 of these computers will be used in the public computer lab, 12 will be distributed to the Brownsville Literacy Center, and 5 will be given to the United Way office. These computers will be hooked up to the Library Systems existing Network and have access to the Internet with the shared Broadband speed of 70MBPS.

Texas Southmost College is requesting 30 Dell Latitude E640 Laptop computers and a LAP30ERBFR-GM 30-Unit Assembled Laptop Storage Cart with 8-inch Casters Front Electrical Unit(A0383375).

Workstation software

All computers at the City of Brownsville Public Library System will be equipped with Microsoft Office 2007 Pro, resume writing software, and access to the over 100 online databases that the Library System subscribes to in conjunction with the Texas State Library.



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Laptop computers purchased for Texas Southmost College will also be equipped Microsoft Office software and will have the Aztec Software which helps users with work readiness skills. Aztec’s multi-sensory approach contains English and Spanish audio, graphics, and innovative screen design that reinforces and enhances learning for secondary youth and adults.

Business related software and resources will also be provided for the computers as will software supporting technical instruction offered at the the on-campus computer lab. In addition, the TSC Language Institute, a center that teaches both English and Spanish skills, will provide language software.

The Brownsville Adult Literacy Center will be using proven educational software to offer basic math and reading skills, GED Preparation, Keyboarding, and English-as-a-Second-Language (ESL)classes.

Training and education programs

The following partners, Texas Southmost College, the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center, and United Way of Southern Cameron County, will be conducting a variety of training and educational programs with their respective students, clients and community patrons. These programs are all being utilized in efforts to assist community members with reaching their academic and career potential, and to help improve their general quality of life. Training and related workshops will be conducted by countless numbers of partner staff members who have obtained various levels of educational achievement.

In their efforts to expand the reach of Broadband through accessible laptops, Texas Southmost College will be allowing use of their mobile computer center to campus outreach programs, many of which work with students in local school districts and who are working on obtaining college level credit work while still in high school. These programs will be focusing use of the mobile computer center on educating their student participants and parents on college entrance exams, the financial aid process and related areas. Various nationwide outreach programs, such as Upward Bound, are housed at Texas Southmost College. Upward Bound, along with related programs, fully utilize the "Choices" program to assist students with both career and educational resource options. It is important to note that the majority of program participants are considered "at-risk" because they come from low-income households and have parents/guardians who have not obtained a post-secondary education and are therefore at a disadvantage in assiting their child with such endeavors. However, programs such as Upward Bound place a high value on obtaining a post-secondary education and therefore facilitate the entire college entry process for



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students and their parents. The success of this and other programs is crucial to increasing current figures that place the number of area residents ages 25 and higher who have obtained a bachelor's degree at 13.4% - significantly lower than the national rate of 23.4%, as per United States Census figures. Initial estimates place the number of Upward Bound student participants taking dual enrollment college coursework at approximately 50%. With the added resource of the mobile computer center, community patrons, such as parents of Upward Bound student participants, will have free Broadband Internet access on campus and will be better able to assist their child with educational and career options.

The Brownsville Adult Literacy Center will continue their efforts in expanding adult literacy efforts and furthering the goal of bringing adult education opportunities to the public by providing such training and educational programs as GED preparation, English as a Second Language (ESL) classes to serve students who are literate in their native language (Spanish,) Job search, basic Math and Reading instruction and keyboarding. United States Census figures show that 87.2% of households in the Brownsville area speak a language other than English, compared to the national rate of 31.2%. With the typical household averaging 3.2 members and most recent Brownsville Independent School District figures showing approximately 49,000 students it can be safe to assume that mostly every household in Brownsville houses at least one child of school age. Communication between parents and school staff, and subsequently student success, would increase with an increased number of parents being able to speak English well enough to participate in teacher – parent conferences, parent organization meetings and related school district conferences.

The United Way of Southern Cameron County will focus on furthering their goals of providing training and educational efforts in improving clients' financial stability, assisting youth to reach their potential and facilitating healthy life choices for many. As an example, the Infant and Family Nutrition Agency helps mothers gain knowledge about healthy eating habits and basic nutrition to prevent obesity related diseases, such as Diabetes and Heart Disease for their families. Prenatal and breastfeeding education, counseling and support is also provided in efforts to reduce the risk of health problems for babies. As per the Pan American Health Organization, Diabetes is 2 to 3 more prevalent in Hispanics than in non-Hispanics. Further, mortality rates along the U.S / Mexico border are significantly higher than in other areas. Additional Broadband and computer access to those individuals who need it most is sure to raise the quality of life closer to national standards.

Sustainability:

The City of Brownsville Public Library System (System) staff has line items in their budget for maintenance of equipment and for the staff needed to support the Public Computer Center. The Library also has the Network Infrastructure in place to handle the additional load that the new computers would put in the network. The System will maintain all computer equipment and training, as well as manage the circulation of computers. In addition, all maintenance on computers provided to United Way and the Brownsville Adult Literacy Center will be conducted through the System.

Texas Southmost College (TSC) will handle all maintenance on the mobile lab including repairs or replacements on all laptop computers; budget for such has been included in the TSC Operating Budget. In addition, TSC library facilities and library staff will instruct in the use of,



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as well as manage the circulation for, the laptop computers. TSC will also be providing the campus wireless network. In collaboration with Library, and TSC staff will also be providing instruction on college preparation including financial aid research, job skills training, and resume writing.
